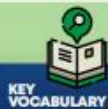
Key Words	Definitions
deposition	When sediment (tiny pieces of rock and soil) is no longer carried by the current and settles onto the bottom of the riverbed.
erosion	The act of washing tiny pieces of rock and soil away.
floodplain	Flat land on either side of the lower section of a river. It is fertile (good for growing crops).
meander	A bend in the river.
river mouth/ estuary	Where a river meets the sea.
sediment	Tiny pieces of rock and soil which are washed along a river by the current (force of the water).
source	Where a river starts.
tributary	A smaller river or stream which adds water to the main river channel.

KEY VOCABULARY

life cycle

a series of **changes in the life of a living thing**, including reproduction

reproduction

the **production of offspring** by a living thing

interconnection

a **connection between two or more things**

mammal

a **warm-blooded vertebrate** that has live young and hair or fur

amphibian

a **cold-blooded vertebrate** that begins life underwater and develops the ability to breathe and live on land

metamorphosis

the **process of transformation to adult** form where a creature completely changes

hibernate

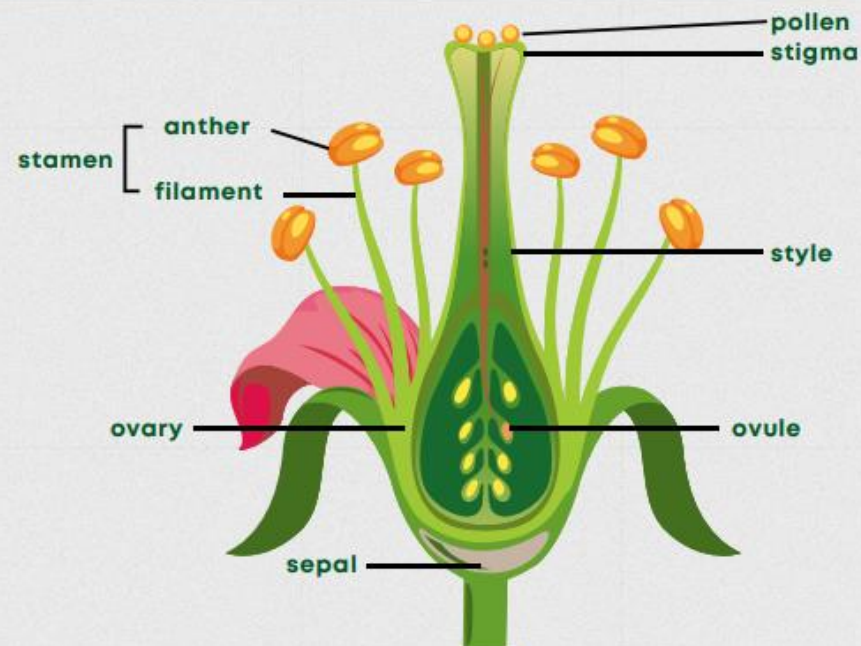
when a creature **spends winter in a very deep sleep** where they rest in a safe, often dark place, to survive the cold

incubate

when a creature **sits on eggs to protect them** and keep them warm before they hatch

larva (larvae)

very young insects or amphibians, before they transform into adults, e.g., caterpillar



most large plants reproduce by combining a male and female gamete (pollen and ovule) to make a fertilised egg that grows into an embryo, the embryo or baby plant is protected inside a seed
